# Mideast Market Administrator's

#### Federal Order No. 33

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The United States Department of Agriculture has announced decisions to amend The Upper Midw est, The Central, The Pacific Northw est, and The Western Milk Marketing Orders.

The U.S.D.A. announced a final rule that will make permanent provisions to the Upper Midw estFederalMilk Marketing Order that were previously implemented on an interim basis. Producers of the Upper Midw estm ik m arketapproved these amendments.

Specifically, this final rule continues to prohibit the ability to simultaneously pool the same milk on the Upper Midw est Federal milk order and on a State-operated milk order that has marketwide pooling. Additionally, this rule continues to limit the amount of milk that can be diverted to nonpool plants from pool distributing plants regulated under the order. The final rule became effective Septem ber 1, 2003.

The U.S.D.A. announced a final decision to make certain provisions, which had previously been implemented on an interim basis, permanent under the Central Milk Marketing Order. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held N ovember 14 and 15, 2001, in K ansas C ity, Missouri.

This decision continues to eliminate the ability to simultaneously pool milk on the Central milk order when the same milk is already pooled on a State-operated milk order that has marketwide pooling. Other provisions establish lower but year-round supply plant performance standards, do not consider the volume of milk shipments to distributing plants regulated by another Federal milk order as a qualifying shipment on the Central order, exclude from receipts diverted milk made by apool plant to another pool plant in determining pool plant diversion limits, and establish a "net shipments" provision for milk deliveries to distributing plants. This final decision leaves the results of the tentative final decision, published November 19, 2002, unchanged, but requires a vote by producers for final approval.

The U.S.D.A. announced a tentative final decision that amends provisions of the Pacific Northwest and Western Federal milk marketing orders. This decision is based on testimony and evidence given at a public hearing held A pril 16-19, 2002, in Salt Lake City, Utah.

The tentative decision eliminates the ability to simultaneously pool the same milk on either the Pacific Northw est or the Western orders and on a State-operated order that has marketwide pooling. For the Western order, the *Pool plant* provision is amended to establish a "netship ments" provision formilk deliveries to distributing plants and the *Producer milk* provision is amended to establish a net diversions provision. Additionally, the *Proprietary bulk tank handler* provision of the Western order is removed.

### USDA AMENDS DAIRY PROMOTION AND RESEARCH ORDER

The U.S. Department of Agriculture announced amendments to the Dairy Promotion and Research Order, effective September 4, 2003. Under the amendments, member representation in 4 of the 13 geographic regions of the National Dairy Promotion and Research Board will be modified to better reflect current milk production in the specified regions. The changes will provide more accurate representation on the board.

The National Dairy Promotion and Research Board, which administers the Dairy Research and Promotion Order, proposed the amendments. The order requires that regional representation be reviewed periodically and changed when necessary to best reflect milk production volume within regions. Based on the Board's review of 2002 milk production data, Regions 1 (Oregon and Washington) and 2 (California) each will gain one board mem ber, while Regions 5 (Minnesota, North Dakota, and South Dakota) and 10 (Florida, Georgia, North Carolina, South Carolina, and Virginia) each will lose one board member.

The program is financed by a mandatory 15-cent per hundred weight assessment on all milk produced by dairy farmers in the contiguous 48 States and marketed commercially.

#### **ORDER 33 MARKET SUMMARY**

The Producer Price Differential for the Mideast Marketing Area for August 2003 was \$-1.20 and the Statistical Uniform Price was \$12.60 for the month. The Statistical Uniform Price is \$0.92 higher than last month, and is \$1.41 higher than August 2002.

The Producer Butterfat Price of \$1.2514 per pound increased 4.59 cents from July 2003 and is up 18.13 cents from a year ago. The Protein Price of \$3.1438 is up 59.58 cents from last month and is up \$12417 from August 2002. The Other Solids Price in August was \$0.0026 per pound, an increase from last month's price of \$-0.0124 and a decrease of 1.51 cents from last August. The Somatic C ell Adjustment rate for August was \$0.00077.

August producer receipts of 1.01 billion pounds were 1.0 percent low er than July 2003, and 25.8 percent low er than August 2002 production of 1.36 billion pounds. Producer milk allocated to Class I accounted for 53.8 percent of the total producer milk in August 2003, more than the 512 percent in July and more than the 41.6 percent in August 2002. A total of 10,724 producers were pooled on the Mideast Order with an average daily delivery of 3,032 pounds compared to 10,791 producers pooled in August 2002 with an average daily delivery of 4,064 pounds.

The market average content of producer milk w as as follows: Butterfat 3.54~%; Protein 2.93~%; Other Solids 5.69~% and Nonfat Solids 8.62~%.

### PROPOSAL RECEIVED TO AMEND FLUID MILK DEFINITION

Dairy Farmers of America (DFA) has requested that the Department of Agriculture (USDA)hold an emergency public hearing to consider a proposal to amend the fluid milk product definition in all 11 Federal milk m arketing orders.DFA's position is that products "intended to be consumed in fluid form" should be classified and priced as Class I. U.S.D.A. has solicited proposals regarding the classification of fluid milk products.

These proposals have not yet been approved for inclusion in a Notice of Hearing. A hearing would be limited to proposals included in the hearing notice. However, appropriate modifications of the proposals included in the notice also m ay be considered at the hearing if the modifications would noten large the marketing area or regulate persons not now subject to the order.

#### **JULY MILK PRODUCTION UP 0.6 PERCENT**

Milk production in the 20 major States during July totaled 124 billion pounds, up 0.6 percent from July 2002. June revised production, at 12.4 billion pounds, was up 0.1 percent from June 2002. The June revision represented an increase of 33 million pounds from last month's pre liminary production estimate.

Production per cow in the 20 major States averaged 1,590 pounds for July, 12 pounds above July 2002.

The number of milk cows on farms in the 20 major States was 7.77 million head, 15,000 head less than July 2002, and 9,000 head less than June 2003.

The Mideast Marketing Area has four states represented in the 20 major states used above. They are Indiana, Michigan, Ohio, and Pennsylvania. Milk production in these Mideast states during July totaled 2.0 billion pounds, up 7 million pounds or 0.4 percent from July 2002.

Production percow in the Mideast states averaged 1,551 pounds for July,53 pounds above July 2002.

The number of cow son farms in the Mideast states was 1.3m illion head, 21,000 head less than July 2002.

### NEW FORWARD CONTRACTING INFORMATION AVAILABLE

USDA-AMS Dairy Programs has continued to collect data concerning the Dairy Forward Pricing Program since submission of the report" A Study of the Dairy Forward Pilot Program and Its E ffect on Prices Paid Producers for Milk, October 2002". The study period for that report ended in March 2002. ## PUBLIC HEARING SCHEDULED TO AMEND PROVISIONS FO THE NORTHEAST AND OTHER MILK MARKETING ORDERS

A hearing is being held to consider proposals to amend all 11 Federal milk in arketing orders. The proposals would reclassify evaporated milk in consumer-type packages and sweetened condensed milk in consumer-type packages from Class III products to Class IV products. Another proposal would reclassify bulk ending inventory each month to the low er-priced class of Class III or Class IV. Proponents have requested that the proposals be handled on an emergency basis. The hearing will convene at 8:30 a.m. on October 21, 2003.
